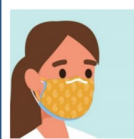

### Face Coverings...Required or Not?



**Does the Board require use of face coverings or have other requirements to provide and receive personal care services related to the pandemic?** No. The Board

encourages all licensees to follow the *recommendations* provided by the Kansas Department of Health and Environment (KDHE) for personal care services. This guidance can be found by clicking [here](#). The Board does not and has not *required* the use of face coverings for providing and receiving personal care services. Please review the KDHE Mask Guidance by clicking [here](#). The Board *requires* compliance with the rules in regulations pursuant to the act authorizing the Board to regulate your profession. All KBOC laws and regulations can be accessed on the KBOC website [here](#).

**Does your local health department require use of coverings or have other requirements to provide and receive personal care services related to the pandemic?** Possibly. Local governments retain authority to issue and enforce equally or more restrictive orders or provisions and retain any authority to issue or enforce isolation or quarantine orders, mask and/or social distancing requirements, maximum capacity limits or other orders restricting movement as necessary to respond to escalating or worsening conditions in any local jurisdiction. You may contact your local health department to ask if there are any requirements or recommendations related to practicing your profession. **My county health department has no restrictions or recommendations. should I require face coverings in my establishment?** The Board cannot provide legal advice. Salon owners should review the KDHE recommendations provided and seek the legal advice of their own attorneys regarding risk management and decision-making.

## Invasive Services

Kansas Cosmetology and Esthetics practitioners are limited to **noninvasive** services by definition.

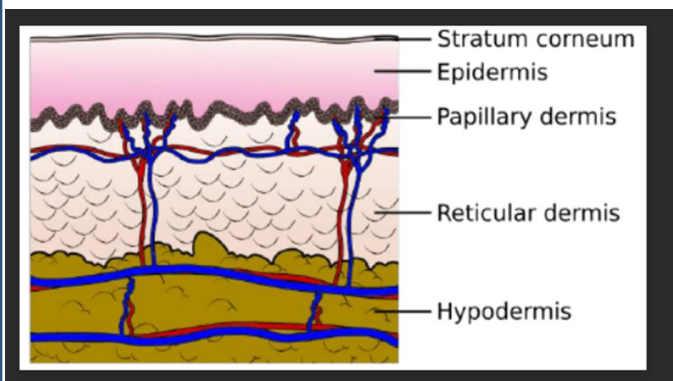
The KDHE (Kansas Department of Health and Environment) defines noninvasive for cosmetology and esthetics services as follows:

K.A.R. 28-24-1 (1) "Noninvasive," when used to describe procedures or services, means the procedures or services confined to the nonliving cells of the epidermis found in the stratum corneum layer of the skin. The practice of cosmetology, nail technology, or esthetics shall not alter, cut, or damage any living cells. Click [here](#) to view the regulation.

**Invasive services are prohibited in any cosmetology profession establishment licensed by the Board.**

KAR 28-24-14(a)(5) - The following shall be prohibited in any establishment or school: using invasive skin-removal techniques, products, and practices that remove viable cells that are deeper than the stratum corneum. Click [here](#) to view the regulation.

Layers of skin:



Regardless of how a service or product is marketed, it must meet the Kansas definition of "noninvasive" to be lawfully used and/or provided under the Kansas cosmetology act. **An invasive service is any service that alters, damages or cuts the living cells.**



## Marketing claims on disinfectants

Regardless of how a company is marketing a product for disinfecting, the product must meet the Kansas requirements for disinfection, including what surfaces can be disinfected. Many manufacturers market their products making claims that:

- 1). It is a disinfectant
- 2). It can be used to disinfect porous surfaces
- 3). It can be disinfected and reused

For example, this product is being marketed specifically to professions licensed by the Board.

*"Our unique 'spray & go', (no rinsing required) disinfectant spray is the quick & easy 'One-Stop solution' for light cleaning, **disinfecting** & deodorising all tools, surfaces & equipment, porous or **non-porous** throughout the **hair/beauty salon, nail bar, tattoo studio or spa.**"*

- 1). According to Kansas regulations pertaining to your profession, does it meet the definition of disinfectant?
- 2). According to Kansas regulations pertaining to your profession, can you disinfect a porous surface?

This product may meet the definition of disinfectant, but it may not be used to disinfect porous surfaces because only nonporous surfaces may be disinfected.

There are also products being marketed as reusable but fall within the Kansas definition of single-use. Therefore, although the manufacturing company is stating that the item can be disinfected and reused, Kansas regulations say that it cannot. Examples are: reusable gloves, reusable nail files and reusable flip flops; all of which are considered single-use and must be discarded immediately after use.

## Requirements for closing your establishment

Do you know what you need to do if you need to close an establishment license with the Board?

- ◆ K.A.R. 69-6-7. When any (cosmetology profession) establishment is permanently closed, the holder of the establishment license shall notify the board in writing and surrender the establishment license within 10 days of closing.
- ◆ K.A.R. 69-15-14 (g). Each (body art profession) establishment licensee shall notify the board in writing and surrender the establishment license within 10 days of closure of the establishment.
- ◆ K.A.R. 69-12-4. When a tanning facility is permanently closed, the tanning facility operator shall immediately mail the tanning facility license to the Kansas state board of cosmetology.

### Why is this important to do?

1. It is required by regulation.
2. Not doing so could result in disciplinary action.
3. The location is licensed under you regardless of what business is operating in that location. You may be held responsible for any violations and fines associated with that establishment license, even if it expires.
4. Inspectors must verify closure of the establishment which may include multiple attempts to inspect the location.
5. Other occupants of the location will not be able to apply for licensure until the previous license expires, has been cancelled or you provide authorization for the business to operate under your licensure until the ownership is transferred.

## Electronic Records

### Electronic Records for Tanning:

On March 8, 2021, the Board interpreted "in writing" as used in K.S.A 65-1921 as including electronic formats.

### Electronic Records for Body Art:

On November 14, 2016, the Board approved the use of digital media as acceptable documentation of corrective procedure photographs for clients with the understanding that the file must be saved under the name of the client and date of service made.

### Electronic records for schools:

On September 14, 2020, the Board formally interpreted language from K.A.R. 69-3-7 "reasonable amount of time" to be 10 years. There is no required form at this time, and the Board will not dictate how that information is stored. Pursuant to K.A.R 69-3-7, the student record must contain the daily attendance record, practice services completed and a final record that verifies the curriculum requirement and hours have been successfully completed.

## Portable Sinks

Portable sinks are permitted in a licensed establishment if the requirements of K.A.R. 28-24-13 are met.



All sinks, whether portable or not, must provide hot and cold running, potable water.

Each establishment must have plumbing that provides hot and cold running, potable water at all times and that provides for the disposal of used water.

## **Microblading/Microshading**

Don't be fooled! Microblading/Microshading is a form of permanent cosmetic tattooing!

Some may refer to the process as a semi-permanent tattooing. However, this phrase may be an effort to remove the process from the realm of tattooing which requires licensure. It is, nonetheless, **tattooing**. This term may also refer to the fact that the process or the pigments used are not as permanent as in the tattooing process.

The process requires a tool of tiny needles that make up a blade used to "draw" hair-like lines in the shape outlined by the practitioner. Then, pigment is applied either with the pen or rubbed into the cuts created by the needled blade to allow the pigment to get under the skin. A practitioner may use either or both a numbing cream and liquid anesthetic when providing this service.

The healing process is between 25-30 days and most often requires a return touch-up visit at the end of the healing process. Microblading is used to reconstruct damaged brows, fill in gaps, or to create a desired definition for brows. The results last for up to three years.

The Kansas Board of Cosmetology has determined that microblading and microshading is tattooing and requires a tattoo or cosmetic tattoo license for providing this service, under a licensed tattoo or cosmetic tattoo establishment. Cosmetologists and Estheticians **cannot** provide this service within the scope of their license. Violations may result in disciplinary action as well as fines. Licensed practitioners providing this service without a tattooing license could lose their existing license.

Please be informed that to provide tattoo, body piercing or cosmetic tattoo services in Kansas without a valid Kansas license is a violation of Kansas law and may subject you to legal action. Likewise, a facility that employs an unlicensed individual is in violation of Kansas law and may also be subject to legal action.

## **K.S.A. 65-1941(a)**

No person, including a tattoo artist, cosmetic tattoo artist or body piercer, shall perform tattooing, cosmetic tattooing or body piercing on another person, display a sign or in any other way advertise or purport to be a tattoo artist, cosmetic tattoo artist or body piercer unless that person holds a valid license issued by the board. This act does not prevent or affect the use of tattooing, cosmetic tattooing or body piercing by a physician, a person under the control and supervision of a physician, a licensed dentist, a person under the control and supervision of a licensed dentist, an individual performing tattooing, cosmetic tattooing or body piercing solely on such individual's body.

## **Want to know how to become a practitioner to provide microblading, microshading and other permanent cosmetic services?**

To receive a Kansas Tattoo or Cosmetic Tattoo license you must obtain and complete a 1200 hour apprenticeship under an approved Tattoo and/or Cosmetic Tattoo Trainer. Individuals interested in an apprenticeship should contact licensed tattoo facilities in Kansas, speak to the owners and see if a trainer is available to provide the training for you. Trainers will provide an apprenticeship that meets the minimum curriculum requirements set forth by the board in K.A.R. 69-15-2.

Once you have located a Trainer, you will need to submit the [Apprentice Application](#), which would need to include the \$15 fee, a copy of your Driver's license or U.S. government issued ID and a copy of your social security card. We will also need a copy of your High School transcripts, which must come directly from the High School or Board of Regents to the Board of Cosmetology. You may request your transcript to be sent over to our office prior to the application being received to help processing go faster.

When the applications are received and processed, the trainer and apprentice license will be mailed out to the tattoo facility and the training shall begin. Other documentation will be provided at that time to further instruct on how to perform and document the training during the apprenticeship.

Once the training is complete, the trainer will refer the apprentice for testing and the apprentice will submit the [Practitioner License Application](#) on our website, which will include the requirements needed in order to make the application complete. Once the Board has a complete practitioner application on file and the passing exam scores, a practitioner license will be mailed out.

## Board Verifications/Reciprocity Updates

The Kansas Board of Cosmetology receives many requests to have a Kansas practitioner license verified to the State of Missouri for licensure. In August 2020, the State of Missouri changed the statute that determines reciprocity requirements for the Missouri Board of Cosmetology and Barber Examiner applicants. The Missouri Board must now require applicants to hold a current license issued by another state for at least **one year** before being eligible to apply for a Missouri license by reciprocity. This may affect those students who are planning to apply for a Missouri license after graduating cosmetology school in Kansas.

If you have been licensed in Kansas for at least a year and wish to apply for a license in Missouri, you will need to request a board verification from the Kansas Board of Cosmetology by submitting the [Licensure or Training Verification Form](#), which is located on the Board's website at [www.kansas.gov/kboc](http://www.kansas.gov/kboc) under forms and applications. Once the Board office receives your form and request, we will send a verification of your Kansas license directly to the Missouri Board as they require.

## Do you plan to apply for a license within another state?

If so, you may want to research the licensing and application requirements for the state you are interested in. The Kansas Board of Cosmetology does a great job of staying current on updates with our neighboring states. However, it can become difficult to know what each state requires; therefore, it is always suggested to contact the State Board in the state you are interested in becoming licensed with and inquiring about what is required. The Kansas Board of Cosmetology can verify your Kansas practitioner license and/or training to any state at your request by submitting the [Licensure or Training Verification Form](#) which is located on the Board's website at [www.kansas.gov/kboc](http://www.kansas.gov/kboc) under forms and applications. This form requires a \$20 fee, a copy of your U.S. government issued photo ID and social security card. The name listed on both ID's must match identically before Board staff can process your request.

## Tanning Operator FAQs

### What are the requirements for a tanning device operator?

One of the most common violations for tanning facilities

is failure to have a tanning device operator present. The tanning device operator is an individual who has received training and who is responsible for the operation of all tanning devices.

### A trained tanning device operator:

- Must be present during operating hours and whenever a tanning device is operated;
- Provides the customer with eyewear;
- Controls the operation of the tanning device;
- Instructs consumers on the proper operation of the tanning device;
- Places any towels used by a consumer in a covered container after use;
- Disinfects the tanning device eyewear after each use.

### What are the training requirements for a tanning device operator?

A tanning device operator must have knowledge of:

- Board regulations;
- Procedures for correct operation of the facility;
- Recognition of injury or overexposure;
- Manufacturer's procedures for operation and maintenance of tanning devices;
- Emergency procedures for injuries.

### How do I obtain training?

Training may be obtained from a professional tanning organization or may be provided in-house by a trained tanning device operator. Click [here](#) to view a list of professional organizations that offer training.

### What do I need to have to show that employees have been trained?

The facility must have a log of all trained operators and verification of training available at the establishment. A Log of Tanning Training form can be found on the Board's website by clicking [here](#).

### Does the owner of a tanning facility license have to be a trained tanning device operator?

No.

### Does a trained tanning device operator have to be present at all times when the facility is open?

Yes.

**HB 2370** - Prohibiting a criminal conviction from acting as a sole disqualification for occupational licensure and creating guidelines to follow when considering criminal convictions of an applicant for occupational licensure. HB 2370 was introduced and referred to the House Committee on Commerce, Labor and Economic Development on February 11, 2021. It was originally scheduled for a hearing on February 24, 2021, but the hearing was cancelled. This bill will still have an opportunity for hearing next year. Click [here](#) to view the bill.

**HB 2161**- Renaming the Kansas State Board of Cosmetology, creating new categories of licenses issued thereby and extending the board's enforcement authority to non-licensees. HB 2161 was introduced on behalf of the Board of Cosmetology by Representative Arnberger and referred to the House Committee on Health and Human Services on January 27, 2021. No hearing was granted for 2021. This bill will still have an opportunity for hearing next year. Click [here](#) to view the bill.

## Legislative Updates Continued

**HB 2066** - Substitute for HB 2066 by Committee on Commerce, Labor and Economic Development - Expanding the military spouse and service member's expedited licensure law to all applicants who have established or intend to establish residency in Kansas. HB 2066 was introduced on January 14, 2021, sponsored by Representatives Croft, Owens, Proctor, Tarwater and Thomas. It was referred to the House Committee on Commerce, Labor and Economic Development, granted a hearing on January 19, 2021, and passed committee. The House passed the bill, and it was received by and introduced in the Senate on March 5, 2021. On May 10<sup>th</sup>, it was referred to the Senate Committee on Federal and State Affairs, granted hearing on March 11, 2021, and passed out of committee. The Senate passed the bill and it was approved by the Governor on April 21, 2021, to be in effect upon publishing in the Kansas statute book on July 1, 2021. Click [here](#) to view the bill.

**HB 2407** - Requiring postsecondary educational institutions to adopt a policy on sexual assault, domestic violence, dating violence and stalking. HB 2407 was introduced and referred to the House Committee on Federal and State Affairs on February 22, 2021, and has not been granted a hearing. This bill will still have an opportunity for hearing next year. Click [here](#) to view the bill.

**HB 2424** - Amending the definition of "race" in the Kansas act against discrimination to include traits historically associated with race, including hair texture and protective hairstyles. HB 2424 was introduced and referred to the House Committee on Federal and State Affairs on February 25, 2021, and has not been granted a hearing. This bill will still have an opportunity for hearing next year. Click [here](#) to view the bill.

**SB 137** - Expanding the military spouse and service member's expedited licensure law to all applicants who have established or intend to establish residency in Kansas, providing for licenses in an emergency declared by the legislature, allowing telemedicine by out-of-state healthcare providers and permitting the use of electronic credentials. SB 137 was introduced in the Senate on February 3, 2021, and referred to the Senate Committee on Commerce on February 4, 2021. A hearing was granted on February 23, 2021. Although the bill will still be active in 2022, the language in the bill was very similar to the language of HB 2066 and the bills were simultaneously worked to achieve the final amended HB 2066 which was passed and approved by the Governor April 21, 2021. ## Legislative Updates Continued

**SB 134** - Requiring state agencies to draft and implement minimum staffing plans. SB 134 was introduced by Senator Pittman on February 3, 2021, and referred to the Senate Committee on Ways and Means on February 4, 2021. It was not granted a hearing for 2021. This bill will still have an opportunity for hearing next year. Click [here](#) to view the bill.

**SB 64** - Amending the private and out-of-state postsecondary educational institution act to clarify the state board of regents' authority and provide additional student protections and institutional accountability. SB 64 was introduced on January 25, 2021, and referred to the Senate Committee on Education January 26, 2021. It was granted a hearing on January 28, 2021, and passed out of committee and placed on the consent calendar and passed on February 9, 2021. It was received, introduced by the House and referred to the House Committee on Education February 10, 2021. It was granted a hearing on March 17, 2021, passed committee, passed the House March 24, 2021, and was Approved by the Governor on April 2, 2021, effective July 1, 2021. **SB 34** - Sunsetting administrative rules and regulations five years after adoption unless extended by the legislature. SB 34 was introduced in the Senate January 14, 2021, and referred to the Senate Committee on Federal and State Affairs on January 15, 2021. It was granted a hearing on January 26, 2021. It was not passed out of committee. This bill will still have an opportunity for more action during this 2021-2022 session. Click [here](#) to view the bill.

**SB 10** - Enacting the right to earn a living act to minimize unnecessary occupational licensing and regulation. SB 10 was introduced January 11, 2021, sponsored by Senators Hilderbrand, Fagg, Steffen, Straub, and Thompson. It was referred to the Senate Committee on Commerce on January 12, 2021, and granted a hearing on January 27, 2021. It was not passed out of committee. This bill will still have an opportunity for more action during this 2021-2022 session. Click [here](#) to view the bill.

## Regulation Updates:

### Adopted and effective 01/08/2021

Cosmetology professions. **KAR 69-3-8:** Allowing distance education for the theory portions of the cosmetology profession curricula and increased allowance for credit to completion of a cosmetology program from a completed manicuring or esthetics program.

### Regulations In progress:

Regulations must be approved by the Kansas Division of Budget, the Kansas Department of Administration and the Kansas Attorney General's Office. Once approved by all three of these entities, the Board will be able to schedule a public hearing for the adoption of these regulations. The Board has started the regulation adoption process for the following regulations.

### All professions.

**KAR 69-16-1:** Defining gross negligence and unprofessional conduct for all professions licensed by the Board.

### Cosmetology Professions.

**KAR 69-11-3:** Setting expiration dates for cosmetology profession apprentice licensure in regulation.

**KAR 69-1-4:** Removing the requirement that the client protection portion of the practical exam be scored separately.

**KAR 69-1-8:** Updating outdated wording referring to a doctor's statement.

**KAR 69-3-7:** Updating "reasonable period of time" to 10 years and implementing student record requirements for closed schools.

**KAR 69-6-2:** Removing language regarding sale or change of ownership that is conflict with statute.

**KAR 69-6-3:** Revoking entire regulation due to outdated wording and duplicate authority already provided in statute.

### Tanning Profession.

**KAR 69-12-18:** Defining "access" and requiring that access be limited to one person at a time.

### Body Art Professions.

**KAR 69-15-6:** Establishing that a temporary permit holder is not eligible to continue to practice if failing examination.

**KAR 69-15-9:** Correcting the expiration requirements for body art licensure.

**KAR 69-15-31:** Required by K.S.A 74-120 regarding criminal records and advisory opinions.

**K.A.R. 69-15-7:** Allowing for a body art written practical exam.

### KDHE Body Art Infection Control Regulations:

Pursuant to K.S.A 65-1,148. The Kansas Department of Health and Environment (KDHE) shall adopt rules and regulations establishing sanitation standards for professions, shops, salons, facilities, clinics, schools and colleges regulated by the state board of cosmetology. Board staff have been meeting weekly with KDHE staff and body art subject matter experts to develop new body art infection control regulations which will be implemented under the KDHE (Kansas Department of Health and Environment). Once finalized, these regulations will come back to the Board of Cosmetology for review and upon approval, KDHE will begin the regulations adoption process which will include a public hearing on the new regulations. We have almost completed the final review for the updates in our meetings and hope to have a new set of infection control regulations to the Board for review by June or July 2021.

## How to attend Board Meetings

The Board posts the Board agenda prior to the Board meetings with the information on how to attend the meeting either by video or phone conference. 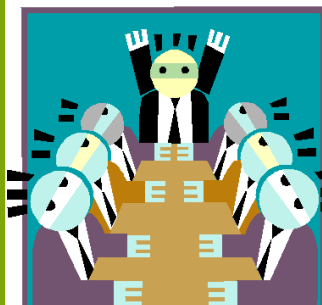


### Welcome Alexis!
